## **Tadcaster's Past**

#### River Wharfe Tadcaster - River Hunters Filming - Sky History Channel

On the 6th – 8th June 2021 the Film Company Hello-Halo.tv were in Tadcaster to film a History and Archaeological programme about rivers for The Sky History Channel. The company were keen to film the River Wharfe at Tadcaster due to its historical past. From criminals disposing of evidence, battle sites, boats overturned and losing their cargo, industrial detritus to thousands of lost personal effects and secrets of the past currently lie hidden in the rivers and were waiting to be discovered.

During the process a camera team carried out a fingertip search guided by handheld metal detectors, no other equipment was used, this technique minimalised disruption to the riverbed.

On the day a selection of small items were found, a local specialist archaeologist later carried out some x -ray examinations to discover that the find included a pair of copper alloy livery buttons, made in London between 1835 and 1842 by George William Boggett



& Co in St Martins Lane, the gilding design suggests they belonged to a Baron or Baronet. There were a few notable families around Tadcaster but without cleaning, the initials are not clear enough to make out. The gilding suggests they were of some quality. As the items are of significant local interest and were discovered on Council land all the artifacts including some older horseshoes, an older barrel stop and some other small items are to be returned to Tadcaster.

The programme is to be broadcast later in the year a date is to be announced by the channel in due course, look out for information which will be put on the Tadcaster Town Council Facebook page.

### Welcome Back Funding for Tadcaster

Your Council is always on the lookout for ways to improve Tadcaster so it was a nice surprise to hear in April of an £80,000 Welcome Back grant from central government to be shared between Selby, Sherburn in Elmet, Tadcaster and the surrounding villages.

The aim of the fund is to Welcome Back residents and visitors to the town postlockdown and Tadcaster Town Council was asked by Selby District Council for ideas of short-term measures that might help. The resulting Wishlist included extra hanging baskets in the centre of the town; cycle racks; more lights to welcome in the Christmas season; money to support the Super-Sat -Tad-Day market that happened on September 11th and more banners and publicity for the ever-popular Christmas market. All these things have either been delivered or are on the way.

Plus, there's an urgent request in to clean the bus station and to tackle the unsightly weeds that disfigure parts of our lovely town. Beyond all this, a district wide project to produce digital, artistically designed maps is underway and we can use this for notice boards and leaflets to raise Tadcaster's profile and encourage others to come and enjoy this great place.

### Three tips to stay safe, warm and well this winter

Kate, the Energy Doctor, provides free and independent advice to Selby District residents on being warm and well. Here she shares 3 tips for winter:

#### Sign up for the Priority Services Register

This gives extra support if there was a power cut or if your gas supply was interrupted. You are eligible if you are a pensioner, have a physical or mental disability or chronic illness, dependent on electricity for medical reasons, have a hearing or visual impairment, or have a child under 5. Apply (enter code 006): https:// bit.ly/ngnpriorityregister or 0800 040 7766.

#### Apply to your electricity supplier for the Warm Home Discount

This is a  $\pounds140$  grant towards winter energy bills. You may qualify if your household income is under  $\pounds16,190$  and there is a child, pensioner or someone with a physical or mental health condition in the home. Be aware of carbon monoxide (CO) CO is known as the Silent Killer, you can't see it, smell it or taste it. It is produced when fuel doesn't burn properly and can come from LPG, oil and wood/coal burning appliances, as well as gas systems. At low levels, symptoms of CO are like having a cold, flu, headache or nausea. Buying an alarm is a great way to keep safe but also get your appliances serviced annually, keep chimneys swept, and don't block vents.

## Remembrance Sunday in Tadcaster

On Sunday 14th November 2021 Tadcaster will remember the service and sacrifice of all those that have defended our freedoms and protected our way of life. In addition, this year we are also celebrating 100 years of the unveiling of the Tadcaster War Memorial. A special re-dedication service will be held during Remembrance Sunday at the War Memorial which sits proud at the junction on Chapel Street.

As in previous years there will be a parade from the central carpark at 09:30 followed by a Church service in St Mary's at 10:00 where numbers will be restricted, and then wreath laying at the War Memorial at 10:50 followed by a two-minute silence at 11:00 and a final blessing.

Tadcaster War Memorial was unveiled by Sir Edward Brooksbank of Healaugh Manor (who lost two sons in the Great War) in July 1921. It was the Brooksbank family who agreed to transfer ownership and care of the memorial to the Town Council and it is hoped that a representative of the family will attend this ceremony. The memorial was erected in honour of the men of Tadcaster who gave their lives in the First World War and was inscribed: -

"In honour of the men of Tadcaster who gave their lives that others might live in freedom 1914-1919. See ye to it that their names are not forgotten." Further names were added following the Second World War.

The construction is Portland Stone and consists of a cross surmounting an ornately carved pillar which stands on an octagonal base on which are mounted 12 bronze plaques. The upper row of plaques list 107 names of those who died in the First World War, and the lower row, 32 names from the Second World War.

This year marks 100 years of Tadcaster War Memorial and we are proud to able to celebrate this monumental occasion with a re-dedication ceremony.

### Tadcaster's Neighbourhood Plan – a plan for our future prosperity

Over the past year, a group led by the Town Council and Chaired by David Gluck of Tadcaster and Rural CIC has been working hard to develop a new Plan for the town. The Neighbourhood Plan will in time become a legal document setting out a range of policies to enable growth in sectors like housing, business, green spaces, leisure facilities etc. Ultimately for it to become that statutory document, it will be voted on by citizens in a referendum where a simple majority vote will 'make' the Plan.

The first major stage of getting to thattown, including proposals for new proposalsreferendum is the consultation on its draftfor homes, leisure and employment. We hopepolicy intentions, running from 15th October tothat the responses to our own Neighbourhood12th November with surveys posted to everyPlan will feed into the Selby Plan and that thehousehold and business in the town. responses to this consultation will shape the future of the Plan and it is of course essential that the views of our



people are heard and reflected on. In time, our Neighbourhood Plan will form Tadcaster's chapter of the Selby District Local Plan. That Plan was consulted on at its 'preferred options' stage earlier in 2021, and a further consultation on its 'publication draft' will take place early in 2022. The District wide Plan sets out a range of significant policies for the town, including proposals for new proposals for homes, leisure and employment. We hope that the responses to our own Neighbourhood Plan will feed into the Selby Plan and that the voices of our citizens are heard.



### Celebrating 20 years of twinning... the signpost is up!

The towns of Tadcaster and Saint Chély d'Apcher were officially 'twinned' in the summer of 1999 and, in the years since then, there has been a wide range of social and cultural visits and exchanges, developing the links between the two communities and helping to establish many long-term friendships. In August 2019, a group of us from Tadcaster visited Saint Chély to join in the celebrations to mark the 20th anniversary of our twinning and, as part of this, gifts were exchanged between the two towns. We received a fine set of three paintings of Tadcaster produced by a local Saint Chély artist and these are on permanent display in the Barn, Tadcaster.

For our part, we gifted the town of Saint Chély a large, bespoke, wooden signpost, designed to point the way to Tadcaster from the centre of Saint Chély and complete with distance in both miles and kilometres! However, the installation of the sign was delayed by various matters, including mayoral elections and then, of course, Covid-19! But I am very happy to be able to report that the signpost now stands in pride of place in the centre of Saint Chély!

On Saturday 31 July this year, my wife and I, along with Jon and Debbie Palmer (Jon is a previous Chair of the Twinning Association) were able to join with our Saint Chély friends in celebrating the installation of the signpost. The recently elected mayor of Saint Chély, Christine Hugon, and several members of the French Twinning Committee and friends and family gathered to place the signpost in position. A few words were shared by both the French and the English to commemorate the event and to underline our common commitment to continuing the links and friendship between our two towns.

Following the installation of the post, we were invited to a mayoral reception and refreshments in the Town Hall. Thanks go yet again to our Saint Chély friends for their warm welcome and kind hospitality.

### Tadcaster Flood Alleviation Scheme

### What you can do to stay prepared

Remember that even homes and businesses which are protected by flood defences can still be at risk of flooding. Our free flood warning service provides up-to date information about flood risk straight to your landline, mobile and/or email. Please continue to be prepared and resilient towards flooding by signing up to receive advanced warnings of flooding. Register by calling 0345 988 1188, or visiting www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-floodwarnings

If you are already registered to the Flood Warning Service, again please check if your details need updating by visiting www.fws. environment-agency.gov.uk/app/olr/login Tadcaster Flood Action Group also provide an excellent local service in partnership with ourselves. Please take the time, if you haven't already done so, to sign up for their system which is linked to our incident response. You can do this by visiting www. tadcasterfloodaction.org or www.facebook. com/Tadflood

The Environment Agency has also recently announced that they will be offering new flood warning services to several new locations in Yorkshire including Newton Kyme and Kirkby Wharfe, so please if you live in these locations follow the links above to check your flood risk and sign up. The next edition of our e-newsletter, out soon, will provide an update on the project, highlight some of the work that has been going on over recent months as well as answering some of the frequently asked questions that continue to come our way.

In May we provided an update that, following a review of the hydrological model for Tadcaster, there would be a delay in delivery of the flood alleviation scheme whilst updates to the hydrological model were carried out. An accurate model representing the flood risk situation and hydrological conditions of the River Wharfe at Tadcaster provides the basis of information on which the scheme is to be designed on and helps to ensure the height of any proposed defences and volumes of any storage components of the solution are correct, ultimately ensuring that the level of flood risk protection provided is known and understood. The updates required to the hydrological model are now well underway and are expected to be completed in early 2022.

Once this has been completed we will begin a process where various potential options for reducing flood risk are assessed, using the newly updated hydrological model. This process considers a wide range of criteria, including technical, environmental, economic and financial assessments, to arrive at a 'preferred option' for the scheme. During this process there will be opportunities for you, the community, to feed in your thoughts to ensure your views are considered. This activity is forecast to be completed by the end of 2022, after which activities such as the final design and planning permission are undertaken and the final business case submitted for approval to enable construction activities to start.

Shortly, we will also be undertake ground investigation work and are currently identifying key locations in and around Tadcaster to complete this. These works will provide us with evidence of the composition of the ground where defences may be situated and enable us to design appropriate defences which will align with the existing ground composition. You may therefore see us out and about over the next few months whilst these activities are undertaken. We continue to work hard to identify solutions that are environmentally and socially acceptable as well as being technically feasible and affordable. Each community that we work in has its own characteristics and complexities; there are often many factors to consider that influence or constrain the choice of solution/s. Tadcaster is no different. We need to ensure that the solution is right for the town's flood dynamics as well as being suitable for the local environment, whilst at the same time not increasing the risk of flooding in neighbouring communities and also being affordable.

As the project continues to progress there will be further opportunities for you to feed into the development of the flood alleviation scheme, either through formal engagement events or via one of the communication channels below. We will continue to keep you updated on progress on a regular basis. So please watch this space for news of up and coming engagement events.

What do Local Councils do? Your local council has an overall responsibility for the well-being of your local community. Their work falls into three main categories: Delivery of services, Improve quality of life for residents, Give communities a democratic voice **Becoming a Local Councillor** As a local councillor you can become a voice for your community and make a real change.

Councillors are community leaders and represent the interests of the communities they serve. Local councillors have three main responsibilities: Decision-making, Monitoring, Getting involved locally

To be a Local Councillor you must:

- Be a UK or Commonwealth citizen; or be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland; or be a citizen of another Member State of the European Union
- · Be at least 18 years old
- Be an elector of the local council; or in the past 12 months occupied land or other premises in the area the local council serves (as owner or tenant); or work in the area the local council serves (as your principal or only place of work); or live within three miles of the local council boundary.
