Flood Defence Work in Tadcaster

Maintenance work by the Environment Agency on the riverbank bunds will soon be completed. The current earthwork embankments on the west bank are being brought back to their original design level and any damage repaired.

Temporary sandbag defences are in place to ensure that the flood defence standard is maintained whilst ensuring existing rights of way are accessible but we apologise for any inconvenience caused during these works. Local historic sites around both the motte & bailey (north end) and listed buildings (bridge end) mean that consent is required before work could commence in those areas. One of these has already been granted and once the other is



granted the works will recommence and, weather dependent, the Agency is aiming to have this completed by the middle of October 2018.

We apologise for the period of time these essential works have been in place and the visual impact the fencing and sandbags have in this area.

The Environment Agency continue to work towards plans for a potential new flood defence scheme for the town. Once we have concepts in place we will be engaging with local residents and businesses to ensure the community has its say as to how these will look.



Town Council Grant Aid

The Council recently gave a grant of £500 to Tadcaster Tennis club towards resurfacing their courts.

Helen Hamilton, Club Treasurer said. “The transformation to the club has been amazing! Thank you for supporting our regeneration project. Our work is ongoing as we continue work on the club house, however, membership has already increased this year and we hope now our courts have been upgraded we will continue to see our membership grow.”

Grants were also given to Age UK, Selby District, and Citizens Advice Bureau for their continued work in Tadcaster. Earlier in the year a small grant was

given to St Joseph's Catholic Primary School to replace a goal post that had been vandalised.

Each year the Town Council offers grant aid to a number of local groups and charities. Applications should be received by the end of October. The Town Council Finance and General Purpose Committee will consider grant applications at its next appropriate meeting. In addition to this Small Grant Applications can also be considered throughout the year. Applications can be made up to the total of £250 and subject to availability. Terms and Conditions for the Grant Aid scheme and an application form can be found on the Council's website or call The Ark.

Armistice Anniversary

In 2014 the Town Council began the process of reading names from the war memorial at the annual ceremony of remembrance in November. Each year the names of men inscribed on the memorial who died one hundred years before were solemnly read out. This year that process will end as we celebrate the hundredth anniversary of the Armistice and read out the names of those who died in 1918 and 1919.

Many people who pass that beautiful memorial may not have given it a second glance unless a relative's name appears there or they have an interest in history. The annual remembrance service at the memorial is always well attended and the sacrifice of those commemorated is acknowledged each year. But maybe only a few will think of the actual people whose names are recorded and who walked

along Tadcaster's streets, worshipped in its churches, relaxed in its pubs. The annual reading of names has gone some way towards ensuring that these men have not been forgotten but behind each name is an individual from our town – no different in many ways from any of the current residents except that they were called to make a decision that ultimately cost them their lives in defence of ours. The men fought across all the services and across most of the battlefields of the war, in the trenches of the Western Front and battles such as Ypres, the Somme, Passchendaele but Tadcaster lads died as far afield as Iraq, Gallipoli, Chile and Greece, to name a few. When the call came for them to step forward, these lads were involved in a huge variety of work. Many came from the breweries – as labourers, clerks, underbrewers, office boys – or from the farm lands around – as waggoners or labourers. Others were miners, gardeners, shopkeepers, bank clerks, solicitors, students, butchers, tailors.

Some, like Private John Garbutt who died with the Leeds pals on the Somme, had much local notoriety. Private Garbutt was an excellent sportsman – on the running track, the football field and the cricket pitch where he was described as a "fearless hitter". He was a hero before even getting to the front. While training he

had carried a blazing motorbike out from a garage full of cars and petrol over which a civilian family lived.

They were all ages too. Most, as you would expect, were in their twenties but several were in their teens and some were much older and had experience of war. The youngest, at just 17, was Jack Metcalfe – born in Tadcaster in 1899 and died of wounds on the Western Front in June 1918. The oldest was 41 year-old Gunner Herbert Nelson who was with the 78th Royal Field Artillery and died a few months after the guns fell silent.

Many families gave more than one son to the effort. The Birdsall family of Springhill Terrace gave three sons to the war. Private Thomas Birdsall died on the Somme on the day his regiment, the 10th Battalion The West Yorkshires, lost 22 officers and 688 other ranks.

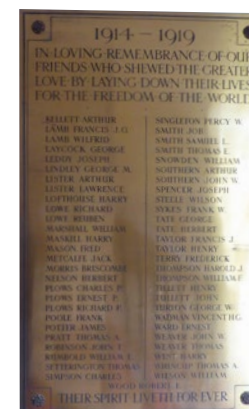
All these men were heroes. All did their duty whether coming forward in a flush of

enthusiasm early in the war when it was to be all over by Christmas or later when the horrors of the war were becoming common knowledge. All stood up and were counted and it is well that we remember them. A final thought – one casualty whose name does not appear on the memorial is Captain Sterne Tighe Edwards DSC and Bar. A Canadian pilot who joined up in 1914 and flew constantly on the Western Front until, exhausted, he was sent to RAF Tadcaster (look for the WW1 hangar off the A64 near Bramham) in 1918 to train other pilots. On the day of the Armistice, Captain Edwards flew a victory flight over Tadcaster but lost control of his plane over the runway and crashed. He died, aged 25, a few days later and is buried in our own cemetery.

His name will be the last read out at the November 11th ceremony as we conclude our tribute to the men of Tadcaster who died between 1914 and 1919. We will remember them.

We Will Remember Them

This November will commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the end of the First World War. There will be several events in Tadcaster as part of the commemorations.

The Remembrance Day Parade and Service at St Mary's Church will be on Sunday 11th November. There will be services at the Methodist Chapel and St Joseph's Catholic Church, after which the congregations join together at the War Memorial.

Tadcaster will also be taking part in the "Battle's Over, a Nation's Tribute". In commemoration and remembrance of the end of the war and the many millions who were killed or came home dreadfully wounded, 1000 beacons of Light will be lit at 7pm on 11th November throughout the United Kingdom and UK overseas territories. In Tadcaster we will be lighting the Town Beacon on the corner of Garnet Lane and Leeds Road. At 7.05pm St Mary's Church will take part in the "Ringing for Peace, Armistice 100" event by ringing out a full peal of bells. The Riley Smith Hall, which was built for the town as a "Victory Hall" after World War I, will be hosting a charity concert. As part of the celebrations Tadcrafters have been busy during the last year knitting and crocheting poppies and sewing them together to

create banners. 1469 poppies have gone into a panel, which will form part of a large banner which will be hung outside Selby Abbey. 1823 poppies have gone into eight smaller banners to hang in the Riley Smith Hall for their celebrations. And Chris and Paul at TadWeld have very kindly made 3 wreath frames, which will also be decorated for the Hall. Further details of events will be available closer to the day and will be posted on Council noticeboards. Full timings of the day will be posted in the window of the Ark, 33 Kirkgate.



This year's Christmas Festival will include events and activities on the weekend of 1 & 2 December with the Christmas Market to be held on Sunday 2 December. Further details will be available in the Winter edition and on local websites. If you are organising an

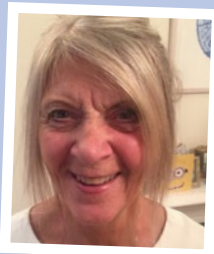

Tadcaster Costume Exchange

Events like Halloween and World Book Day can often be expensive when children (and adults!) want to dress up as their favourite character, or as a werewolf or a princess. The Tadcaster Costume Exchange will give people access to loads of different outfits and accessories that have usually only been worn once or twice.

Library volunteer Katherine says, "It's exciting as it ticks lots of boxes; it will save parents and other borrowers' money, it will reduce new purchases and save waste, and will be fun for the kids to get involved."



The initiative will encourage people to donate their used dress-up outfits to the library. They will then be categorised and made available to borrow. Costumes can be donated at the library any time, and there will be an official launch event on Saturday 29th September where all the outfits will be displayed for people to try on and borrow. In addition, all the outfits and

accessories will be on a Facebook page so people can browse the catalogue of costumes and decide what they want to borrow. There will be a small hire fee to borrow items which will raise funds for the Community Library.

NEWS FROM ULLESKELF

SOS (Support Our Station) ULLESKELF

Swingeing cuts by Northern Rail have effectively halved the service to Ulleskelf Station. Dismay at the proposed changes, operational from May 20th, has turned to anger and action as representations to Northern Rail appear to have fallen on deaf ears.

The current service is so badly planned that it is virtually impossible to make an outward and return journey to Ulleskelf with commuters being the worst affected. Anyone wanting to travel for work, education, health or leisure will have to do so



by car despite the fact that many residents chose to live in Ulleskelf because of the train service and not everybody has or can drive a car. Return journeys can be made to Church Fenton where service has almost trebled to 33 trains per day as opposed to the 7 to Ulleskelf, then you either walk 3 miles or beg a lift, which rather defeats the object. 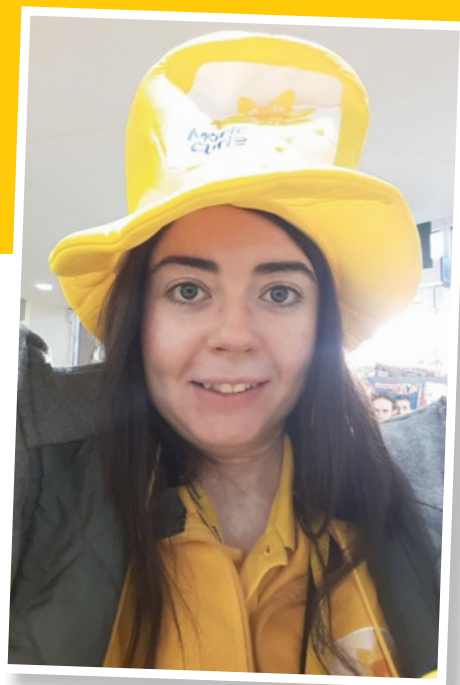
Help Us to Help Others
