What we have achieved 2017-18

Community Festival

The CEF ran a successful "Give It a Go" event, as part of the Community Festival at the Tour de Yorkshire. Twelve Community stalls participated in the event, alongside a CEF stand that also supported Tadcaster in Bloom. There were two competitions, one for the most engaging Community stall and the other a free prize draw for those families that visited each stall.

106 families and individuals took part in the competition. 10 winners were drawn receiving gift vouchers. In addition, three stalls won cash prizes for their organisations – 1 st Selby District Vision, 2nd Church Fenton Air Squadron and 3rd BeeAble.

Community Discovery Day

The CEF organised a Community Discovery Day on Thursday 26th October at the Riley Smith Hall. The event included 24 stalls from different organisations including a Selby Hands of Hope pop up charity shop, consultations on Planning, Disability issues and Leisure Provision in the area, live music, competitions and of course food!

Public Forums

The summer CEF Public Forum event provided the opportunity to discuss future flood prevention in Tadcaster and the villages following the publication of the report into the December 2015 floods. Speakers included: Yorkshire Water Environment Agency, North Yorkshire County Council, and Selby District Council

In September the CEF held two Public Forums – the first focused on next steps across all key stakeholders to avoid future flooding. Members of the public were able to ask a range of questions and get answers to their concerns.

The second Public Forum was "Turning Dreams into Reality - The Transformation of Bolton Percy" www.allsaintsboltonpercy.co.uk The event included a presentation about the work of local residents to successfully save their church, the creation of a range of Heritage projects and reinvigorating their local community.

Our Public Forum held in January included a fascinating presentation from the Tadcaster Medical Centre exploring their work, the challenges they face and an opportunity for residents to ask questions about service delivery.

Our Public Forum in June included information regarding the range of learning opportunities available with presentations from NYCC Adult Learning, Workers Educational Association W.E.A., University of the 3rd Age U3A and Tadcaster and Rural C.I.C.

The CEF has funded a number of initiatives including;

- Tadcrafters to work with residents to create promotional materials for the Tour de Yorkshire.
- Sing Yourself Happy Tadcaster purchasing new sound equipment to continue running singalong groups aimed at predominately people living with Dementia and their carers.
- Development support for Stutton Village Hall
- Tadcaster Community Library have received funding to further develop volunteering opportunities and develop a range of activities to secure ongoing funding for the sustainability of the library
- Funding towards various operating costs of the Church Fenton Community Shop including legal costs, licensing costs and stock.
- Funding to 2434 (Church Fenton) Squadron Air Training Corps towards the purchase of a new minibus.
- Funding towards a project to restore two windows at the St Johns Church in Kirkby Wharfe.

Community Funding

We launched a £25k CEF funding initiative with project ideas to be submitted ahead of the Public Forum. Five organisations developed proposals relating to new services and opportunities for residents in the Tadcaster and Villages CEF area. All of the proposals were successful in securing the funds they needed.

They include;

• Selby District Disability Forum – the creation of a new service for local

people living with a disability to address their needs.

- Selby Hands of Hope to create a new Pop Up Shop service, creating new paid and volunteer opportunities
- Yorkshire Energy Doctor to provide training for people to become Community Energy Ambassadors skilled in advising people how to save money with their energy suppliers
- Tadcaster and Rural CIC to create a Tadcaster Arts Festival
- The Kelcbar Centre to develop a Dementia Forward Café

The CEF receives an annual budget that it can distribute to groups and organisations within the area. There are two types of funding available; grant funding and project funding.

This is a wonderful opportunity to develop new ideas, purchase essential equipment or help to fund community initiatives. Assistance is available to help you plan and complete your application.

Grant Aid and Small Grant Applications

Each year the Town Council allocates money for Grant Aid to be awarded to local groups and projects.

We invite new or existing local organisations to apply for the fund, which is shared among a number of groups each year. If you are a local branch of a larger organisation you are also welcome to apply. In 2017 the Council provided grants to the following groups:

Towards a cleaner Tadcaster

We would like to take this opportunity to say a big Thank You to those who took part and to volunteers who do litter picks throughout the year. The Town Council has a number of litter grabbers that residents and associations can borrow at any time during the year if you would like to help out. You may have noticed some "Pavement Art" recently appearing around Tadcaster. The Town Council has decided on further action to reduce the amount of Dog Waste and have stencilled signs on pavements in problem areas. Bombardier Poole's "Death Penny"

In November Tadcaster commemorates the end of hostilities with a special Remembrance Day - around the newly-cleaned War Memorial - including lighting of a beacon as part of a national initiative (further information available later).

There will be a special peal of bells and if you hear them, think of Frank Poole who was one of the ringers there before 1914. Bombardier Poole of the Royal Field Artillery - in peacetime a Head Grocery Assistant at Tadcaster Co-op - was killed on the Somme in June 1916 aged of 27 while working his gun.

Like every service person killed in the war Frank's family received a Memorial Plaque which became known colloquially as a "death penny". The winner of the design competition was Edward Carter Preston who created the sculptures in Liverpool's Anglican cathedral. The bronze plaque made use of many images but interestingly only the simple name of the deceased was used – no rank or title - since there was to be no distinction between sacrifices made by different individuals.

This photograph of Frank Poole's plaque was provided by Mr John Childs. His wife's father was Ellis Poole, Frank Poole's brother. Mrs Childs remembers playing with it as a child but it must have been lost. Fortunately, it was returned to the Poole family after publicity in the Wetherby News alerted them to its existence. It is now framed and proudly on display with the descendants that Frank Poole gave his life for. **Councillor Greg Lodge**

Angelus Bell to ring out over Tadcaster once more

Tadcaster residents won't need their watches soon as an Angelus Bell will once again sound over the town every day at 6am, noon and 6pm.

St Joseph's Church, as part of its 150th Jubilee celebrations, has refurbished the Angelus bell that sits atop the tower in the church grounds. Climbing vegetation has been cleared away and the electronic chiming mechanism has been cleaned and tested in preparation for the grand "turn-on". The tradition of the Angelus stretches back several centuries. The name Angelus is derived from the Biblical verse, "Angelus Domini nuntiavit Mariæ" - the Angel of the Lord (Gabriel) declared unto Mary - the Annunciation. Traditionally it has been associated with the ringing of a bell as a call to prayer. The normal pattern is a triple stroke repeated three times with a pause before each set. In addition the Tadcaster Angelus bell will ring before Sunday Mass to hurry up any latecomers!

In Tadcaster the Angelus was rung daily in the 1930s. The current bell and tower dates from the 1980s and was erected to commemorate the Pope John Paul's visit to York. The tower cost £2500 and includes the distinctive "crown of thorns" design which replicates the Papal visit logo – a set of keys within a Union Jack. The bell has a longer history. It is dated 1869 and is from the Mears and Stainbank Company who owned the Whitechapel Bell Foundry - the oldest bell foundry in the world – starting in 1570 but sadly closed in 2016. It is likely that the bell hung originally above the church entrance.

Fr John Newman, Parish Priest, says "I am pleased that we can restore this bell and, in so doing, restore the ancient practice of ringing the Angelus in Tadcaster. We hope that all who hear it might stop a moment to pray or simply to reflect before continuing their day's activities". We can all say "amen" to that! **Councillor Greg Lodge**

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As the sun shines outside and our gardens burst into bloom it may seem odd to be talking about Christmas. But it's actually only about 6 months away!

Last year the Town Council found the money for some brand-new lights (see picture) and a survey taken at the Christmas market showed that the vast majority like the new look and want more. So the Council have come up with a costeffective suggestion.

Wrapping lights round the lampposts (similar to those on the bridge) round the Chapel Street, Kirkgate loop, more small Christmas trees around the town, and welcoming lit-up signs (as in Wetherby) at the entrances to the town could extend seasonal cheer at a reasonable cost. There's much more that it would be nice to do and all ideas will be gratefully received – this is a community effort.

But, as ever, money is the problem. Just

to achieve what is suggested above would cost in the region of £7,000. The Town Council doesn't have that to spend so are searching for ways to raise it. They need your help!!

Ideas so far, include fund-raising events, appealing to businesses and individuals to help with match-funding from the Council, fund-raising buckets in shops and at events through the year and crowdfunding online (look out for links on Facebook). All of these would make a difference, but all of them need volunteers. Can you help in any way? Could you shake a tin at the Carnival or the Soapbox Challenge? Could you organise a fund-raising event? Can you help promote crowdfunding? Anything, big or small, is very very welcome. It's about working together to make our town look good. We know Tadcaster is one of the best places around and others should know it too. **Councillor Fiona Greig**

Councillor Vacancy

There is a vacancy for a Town Councillor for the Parish Ward of Tadcaster West. You do not have to live in the west part of Tadcaster for this vacancy. As long as you satisfy one of the following criteria you will be eligible:

- you are an elector of Tadcaster parish
- during the whole of the last 12 months you have occupied, either as owner or tenant, land or other premises in the parish.
- · your principal or only place of work is in Tadcaster parish
- · you live in Tadcaster or within 3 miles of the parish boundary

Councillors usually attend one or two meetings a month and can be involved with as many other related activities or groups as they wish. They take an active part in the local community. The best way to find out what it's like is to be a councillor is to come along to a meeting, which are open to the public, or talk to a councillor.

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In May 2017 the board of directors at Tadcaster Albion AFC opted for a change at the helm, twelve months on and the new management team of Michael Morton and Simon Collins steered the Brewers to their highest ever finish and came close to promotion.

As with any new bosses in charge, especially when it's your first official job in non-league football, it takes time to rubberstamp their philosophies, playing style and also identifying exactly who they want. However this isn't

always easy as players come in for pre-season and are all given a chance which is fair. This was the case at the beginning of their debut campaign as they struggled to find consistency on the pitch as well as with their team selections. The cup competitions can be a massive financial boost to a club the size of Taddy but it was early exits in both the FA Cup and the FA Trophy. It was all change after the New Year though as a corner was turned and the hardworking duo found their feet before going on to make a great impact in the division. The Brewers went on an eight-game unbeaten run spanning from mid-January

to the beginning of March which saw them shoot up the league standings. After a drastic turn in form, Taddy made the play-offs for the first time ever on a dramatic final day. The sem-final saw Albion head to Bamber Bridge,

to whom they had beaten 5-0 at home just a couple of weeks prior to the one-game shoot-out. Despite taking a 60th minute lead through Will Annan, the Lancashire hosts turned it around to grab the win and incidentally go on to achieve promotion. Now the management team

have had a season to get used to the league and the level, they are equipped to make a great challenge for promotion in the new-look Evo-Stik East League in 2018/19. Sheffield United and Leeds United amongst many more are set to visit in pre-season so keep an eye on social media @TadcasterAlbion for news on that.

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Tadcaster Grammar School Proposed Autism Centre



At Tadcaster Grammar School we are trying to seize an opportunity to create a safe learning environment for children who may need a totally bespoke curriculum (or modified provision if they are able to access the full mainstream curriculum) but also benefit from being with children from the community in their local school.

We are trying to renovate an old dilapidated building on the school site into an Autism Base in order to meet the growing needs of young people with Autism Spectrum Condition (ASC) who attend our school. We are hoping to landscape the garden area, add a perimeter fence and create a covered area for outside learning (whatever the weather) where children can learn, play and communicate safely. We are also hoping to acquire a sunken trampoline to help self-regulation. We want to put in a kitchen so that children can complete vocational learning/AQA awards.We want the children to be able to bake and cook with future plans to hold 'Open Café' days to the public community.

A sensory room is also planned along with 'fit for purpose' classrooms etc. The upstairs space is wonderful but currently not accessible, due to fire regulations; hence an outdoor staircase is being looked at. Ultimately we want to be able to meet the requirements of children with more complex needs so that they can attend a local school. We do not have a cost for the project as we hope to rely heavily on volunteers including tradespeople who will volunteer their time and companies who may donate. We also have a few KS4 students with



ASC who follow bespoke timetables and a vocational pathway who, as part of their vocational gualification/accreditation have been keen to complete work on this project (upcycling furniture, helping at a recent cake sale and painting and decorating). Their sense of pride and ownership on the project is incredible and the sense that they are part of something 'big' where they can make their mark and leave their legacy too. The support so far has been incredible with people from our local community. The hope is that we would be able to open in September 2018 in readiness for the new school year. We do have 'big plans' that can only be realised with the support of local businesses, tradespeople, volunteers and fundraising. Let us know if you can help out in any way!

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Local groundbreaking inventor is the subject of new historical book



Alan Swain, Chairman of The Friends of All Saints' Bolton Percy, wrote the book entitled 'Rev. Henry Hunnings MA: Inventor of the carbon granule telephone transmitter' in 2017 after uncovering some exciting information about a relatively unknown 19th century curate of All Saints' Church. The book details the life of Henry Hunnings from his humble birth in Tottenham where he grew up to become a printer, his move North to Bolton Percy and the





personal scandal that beheld him there, his groundbreaking invention of the carbon granule telephone transmitter, his move away from the local area followed by his sudden and untimely death which resulted a few years later following much stress and heartache for this noble man.

The book is both informative and captivating and will appeal to local people, telephone enthusiasts and historians alike. Alan Swain, author, said, "The story of Henry Hunnings captured my interest as soon as I found out about his historical invention. I worked for British Telecom for many years, starting in the days when it was the General Post Office (GPO), and have always had an interest in the history of telephony. Add that to the fact it all took place in my village and involved the old railway station too. I soon wanted to find out more about the little-known Henry Hunnings and have thoroughly enjoyed researching his life."
