Survey seeks your views on Town centre

A new survey is seeking local people's views on Tadcaster town centre. The survey findings will be used to decide future priorities that help local people get more out of their town centre. The survey is being carried out by the People & Places Partnership and has been commissioned by Selby District Council in conjunction with Tadcaster Town Council and the Tadcaster Business Forum. The findings will be discussed widely with local community groups and businesses as part of deciding future priorities.

Chris Wade, who is organising the survey on behalf of People & Places, says "the survey asks local people about their reactions to the Coronavirus pandemic, how they currently use the town centre and their hopes for Tadcaster in future. We want as many people as possible of all ages to take about 10 minutes to tell us about their town".

The overall findings from the survey will be shared here as well as at specially organised meetings involving the Town Council, Business Forum, local groups and businesses. The idea is to develop a 'forward framework' that considers the 'how' and the 'what' of looking after the town centre in future. It uses an approach for revitalising town centres that was developed nationally by the People & Places Partnership for the Local Government Association.

Local people have until Sunday, October 18th to fill in the survey which they can access using the web link below or by scanning the QR code with their smart phone. New Novel Set in Tudor York Raising Funds for St Leonard's Hospice

Tadcaster author **Tony Morgan's** latest book, **The Pearl of York, Treason and Plot,** is a gripping historical novel, set in the atmospheric streets and buildings of Tudor York.

When Margaret Clitherow is arrested for illegally harbouring Catholic priests in The Shambles, a group of her friends, led by a youthful Guy Fawkes, face a race against time to save her from the gallows. As events unfold, their lives, and our history, change forever. Although most of the action takes place within York's city walls, Guy also journeys through the countryside, visiting Rufforth, Tockwith, Knaresborough and Scotton.

Tony became fascinated by the story behind York's most famous (and infamous) Tudor residents.

"Margaret, known as the Pearl of York, and Guy, famous for his role in the Gunpowder Plot, were raised by prosperous Protestant families. Both became Catholic enemies of the state. When I was writing the book, I asked myself what events could have persuaded a happily married woman to consider martyrdom or transform a young Yorkshireman into a terrorist."

All profits from the sale of Tony's novels and history talks will be donated to **St Leonard's Hospice** in York, an independent charity, which provides specialist palliative care and support for local people with life limiting illnesses. **Jill Roberts**, Corporate and Community Fundraiser at St Leonard's, said "We're delighted to know once again Tony is supporting the hospice in 2020 with the profits from his

In September 2019 a branch of the U3A opened in Tadcaster with a welcome from Steve Cobb the Town Mayor. Anti Social Behaviour: North Yorkshire Police Newsletter

Tadcaster town over the years has seen sporadic incidents of anti social behaviour. The youths of today that are wandering around the town are not the ones who caused issues some years ago. North Yorkshire Police are committed to combat any form of anti social behaviour before it begins and officers conduct regular patrol within schools giving presentations on a variety of subjects.


Tadcaster bus station remains a focal point for young people to congregate and the 'Chill Pod' is an area which the youths were given as a meeting point. However this area suffers greatly at times with littering and the mess left behind. The bus station and the chillpod area are well protected by the town's cctv system and can pick up all areas of the the car park. Several incidents have been successfully recorded by the cctv in this area, one being the damage caused by youths kicking footballs at the Medical Centre signage in the summer of this year. Youths were positively identified causing the damage and dealt with accordingly.

This kind of behaviour is not acceptable in the town and NY Police do rely on parents educating their children and knowing where they are. "Keep safe and behave" is not a lot to ask youths to abide by and we hope by working with the community the young people of our area will take this on board and cause no problems. The winter period is always quieter but if we work together we can ensure the summer months bring no issues. It is a minority few that can spoil it for most, NYP together with the local community can work together and keep Tadcaster safe.

All reports of any kind of anti social behaviour will be dealt with robustly and we do encourage the community to report incidents - phone 101 to report issues however should there be incidents ongoing that require immediate police attendance please do not hesitate to use 999.

Planning for the future of the Town...Neighbourhood Plan commences!

It is now 2 years since the first community in Selby district wrote its own local planning document – a Neighbourhood Development Plan. That 'first' went to our near neighbours in Appleton Roebuck. Since then several more communities in the district have undertaken to write such a document, which once approved by the electorate becomes a legal part of the Selby district Local Plan, with policies to guide future planning decisions, including location and design of new homes, green space, business and industry, townscape and heritage features etc. Prior



to the Covid crisis, the Town Council decided to undertake this task for our town. A small group of councillors has been working on this for the past 6 months and the Council has now approved the appointment of an external expert consultant – Mr Mike Dando – to help us write this Plan.

Dorchester Road cemetery wall restoration

Have you included a hole in your fence for hedgehogs yet?

Tadcaster Town Council are proud to present the newly refurbished section of wall along Dorchester Road surrounding Tadcaster's cemetery. The wall was in poor condition but after enlisting B K Parnaby's to restore the wall they have yet again gone above and beyond and we now not only have a safe and aesthetically pleasing wall but the wall now sports a safe and neat hedgehog highway.

We believe the cemetery is home to several hedgehogs which are under threat due to loss of habitat and food. It is therefore critical that they can access a wide range of gardens. Providing a sufficient sized hole (13x13 cm) in walls and fences will allow hedgehogs through but be too small for most pets.

No need to be in fear for your plants and vegetables as these little 'gardeners friends' will clear your garden of slugs, beetles, caterpillars and other bugs so let's embrace our prickly friends but remember they are still wild animals and should not be kept in captivity.

Be mindful of any rubbish as hedgehogs are prone to getting tangled, please help us keep our cemetery and town rubbish free by using bins provided. You can create highways and byways whenever you like, but it is usually easiest in winter when there are fewer leaves on the trees and shrubs.

Interesting fact: a baby hedgehog is known as a hoglet ... awww

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) & S106 Funding...any great ideas?



The Town Council receives contributions from Selby District Council in the form of a Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and S106 funding which allows local authorities to fund infrastructure by charging on new development in their area. Money raised will go towards the costs of projects within the Town.

CIL and S106 contributions can be spent by the Town Council on the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure (such as

open spaces, leisure facilities, schools etc.) or anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area. Last year we helped fund a new traversing (climbing) wall at The Barn for young people (Photo opposite).

Update and a new Consultation from The Environment Agency: the future of Flood Defences

Since the launch of the Tadcaster Flood Alleviation Scheme at our first community engagement event at The Barn, the Environment Agency has been busy preparing for this new consultation on the short list of options for future investment in the town. This has included contracting with our delivery partners, ARUP & Partners Ltd, who will be working in partnership with Jacobs Ltd to deliver the options appraisal. We have continued liaison with the community and stakeholders by newsletters and updates via local networks including Tadcaster Today, TFAG, the Town Council and social media. The <u>@TadcasterFloodScheme</u> Facebook page has also been launched.

Throughout this period the main emphasis has been on producing a feasible short list of options ready to be presented to you, the community. We have been working hard to identify solutions that are environmentally and socially acceptable as well as being technically feasible and affordable. We need to ensure that the solution is right for the town's flood dynamics as well as being suitable for the local environment, whilst at the same time not increasing the risk of flooding in neighbouring communities.

At this stage we are not specifically consulting on things such as how potential new defences may look. We will consult on this in a separate event at a later date, once the preferred option has been identified, to enable your views to feed into the detailed design of the selected option. Note that the "Do Nothing" and "Do Minimum" scenarios are always included when carrying out an appraisal of potential options and are not options being actively considered for Tadcaster. Images of the proposed options 3-4 are shown overleaf

Option 1 - Do Nothing: This replicates a "walk away" situation. This would mean all maintenance of the existing defences would cease and the defences would fall into disrepair over time.

Option 2 - Do Minimum: This replicates a "carry on as we are" situation. This would mean that maintenance of the existing defences would continue as it does currently to maintain the current height and durability.

Option 3 - Raise/strengthen existing defences plus new defences downstream to defend east and west banks. This option/s incorporates improvements to the existing defences, a new section of defence adjacent to Beech Close and then further options on the west bank to help protect properties and access in this area.

Option 3a - fully around Crane Cottages, football ground & rear of brewery;

Option 3b - continuing existing line of brewery wall and then around Crane Cottages;


Option 3c - around Crane Cottage only;

Option 4 - Hybrid solution: This option would include a combination of raised and new defences within the town (detailed above), some off-line upstream storage and increased channel conveyance through the opening of the Tadcaster Bridge arches.


